## 18.100B Problem Set 5

Due Thursday March 10 by 2:30pm. The problem set has been divided into two parts (A,B) to facilitate grading. New: When solving homework problems, you may cite the theorems proved in class. However, you may not cite theorems from Apostol that were not discussed/proved in class. Of course, you can include a proof of these theorems in your homework, but generally there will be a shorter and more direct proof, and you are encouraged to look for that.

## Part A

**1.** (5 pts). Let

$$f(x) = \begin{cases} e^x, & x \le 0, \\ \cos(x), & x > 0. \end{cases}$$

Prove that f(x) is uniformly continuous on  $\mathbb{R}$ .

**2.** (5 pts). Let C([0,1]) be the set of all continuous functions  $f:[0,1] \to \mathbb{R}$ . Define a metric on C([0,1]) by

$$d(f,g) = \sup_{x \in [0,1]} |f(x) - g(x)|.$$

Prove that d(f,g) is indeed a metric, and that (C([0,1]),d) is a complete metric space.

- **3.** (5 pts). Let  $\mathbb{C} = \{x + iy : x, y \in \mathbb{R}\}$  be the complex numbers. We can turn  $\mathbb{C}$  into a metric space using the metric  $d((x_1 + iy_1), (x_2 + iy_2)) = ((x_2 x_1)^2 + (y_2 y_1)^2)^{1/2}$ . Let  $f: \mathbb{C} \to \mathbb{C}$  be a continuous function. Suppose that f(0) = -1 and f(1) = 1 (here 0 = 0 + 0i, 1 = 1 + 0i, and -1 = -1 + 0i). Is it true that there exists a point  $c \in \mathbb{C}$  so that f(c) = 0? Either prove that the answer is yes or provide a counter-example.
- **4.** (5 pts). Let (M, d) be a metric space, where d is the discrete metric. What are the compact subsets of M? (prove that your answer is correct)

## Part B

- **5.** (5 pts). Apostol 4.13: Let  $f: \mathbb{R} \to \mathbb{R}$  be continuous, and suppose f(x) = 0 whenever x is rational. Prove that f(x) = 0 for all  $x \in \mathbb{R}$ .
- **6.** (5 pts). Define  $f: [0,1] \to \mathbb{R}$  by

$$f(x) = \begin{cases} 0, & \text{if } x \notin \mathbb{Q}, \\ 1/n, & \text{if } x = m/n \text{ in lowest terms, with } n > 0. \end{cases}$$

Prove that f is continuous only at the irrational points of [0,1].

7. (5 pts). Recall the definition of a convex set in  $\mathbb{R}^n$  from HW 4. Prove that every convex set in  $\mathbb{R}^n$  is connected.
