## Topics

Your main purpose in this course is to learn how to write clear and correct mathematical proofs. This will pave the way to doing more advanced mathematics. Topics covered include:

- Sets definitions, set operations
- Logic logical connectives, quantifiers
- Proofs direct and contrapositive
- $\circ$  Proofs existence and contradiction
- $\circ$  Induction
- Equivalence relations
- Functions injective, surjective, bijective, inverses and compositions
- Cardinality of sets finite sets and different types of infinite sets
- $\circ$  Elementary real analysis limits of sequences and series, supremums.

Grades will be determined based on better of the following:

- 10% homework + 20% midterm 1 + 20% midterm 2 + 50% final
